BIRD FLEW IN AND LANDED ON A FENCE, THEN DROPPED OFF IT.

Reference to its resemblance to field guide descriptions and illustrations is not enough. Describe only what you actually observe in the field:

THE MOST STRIKING FEATURE OF THIS BIRD WAS ITS BRIGHT RED EYE. THE BIRD WAS CONSIDERABLY SMALLER THAN THE COMMON GRACKLES AROUND, AND WAS ABOUT THE SIZE OF A BREWER'S BLACK BIRD (ALSO IN AREA). THE BIRD WAS LONGER AND CONSIDERABLY CHUNKIER THAN BROWN-HEADED COWBIRDS.

Description (continued):

THE UPPER PART OF THE BIRD (HEAD, UPPER BACK AND BREAST) WERE DARK BROWN WHEREAS THE REST OF THE UPPER PART OF THE BIRD WAS MUCH MORE GLOSSY LIKE BREWER'S BLACKBIRD. THE BILL WAS LARGER THAN BROWN-HEADED COWBIRD.

BREWER'S BLACKBIRD - EYE COLOR, TWO TONE BODY COLOR

If you watch birds solely for your own enjoyment, a written description of your observations is unnecessary. But, if you have seen something unusual, and would like to share this with others, a written description is essential. Compilers of regional bird lists must insist that their records be scientifically sound; future bird students--those studying occurrences 50 years from now--must have a written record on which to depend. By providing the verifying written description, you are employing a basic rule of the scientific method.

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We recognize that experienced field observers can provide important and reliable records, if supported by an adequate verifying description. Thus this request is an effort to perpetuate your record by obtaining concrete evidence which may be permanently preserved for examination by others in the future. This procedure is required for every extraordinary observation, irrespective of the observer.

Bird flew to fence in backyard with feeder. Perched on fence, seemed to rest (after feeding at backyard feeders) then flew off with direct flight.

Describe the habitat in which you observed the bird:

Urban. Backyard feeders.

Seen head on, perched, from above and in flight. Overall, a rather large cowbird, about 10" (about size of ♀ Brewer's Blackbird). Overall dull colored. It is a dull brownish-gray; has a 2-toned look with a clear demarcation on upper breast between the upper (head, chin, throat) plain dirty grey, and lower (belly & underside) soft dull grayish tan. Head and chest puffy but I did not see an inflated ruff. Head large & long with flattened crown. Bill black, large, powerful, long and with down-curved culmen and down-curved cutting edge. Iris brilliant orange-red. Undersides even and clean, not streaked.

Describe the bird's calls or sounds, if heard; including method of delivery-- i.e., from perch, in flight, etc.:

Not noted.

List similar species and how you eliminated them:

Brown Cowbird has smaller bill, black eye, black body (♂) and ~~on~~ streaked or streaked undersides (♀).

Red eye; dull plumage eliminate all other blackbirds.

I've seen all N.A. black birds.
