All six birds called from the marsh floor. We heard also 53 Virginia Rails and 10 Sora in the 4 marshes we went to in Otero and Bent Cos on May 7, 1994.

We identified the birds by their "ki ki doo" song which we heard many times during the night of May 7, 1994. We did not see any of the birds.

Describe the bird's song and call, if given, including method of delivery, (i.e. from perch, in flight, duration): The birds sang from the marsh giving a ki ki doo call and one gave it territorial grunt call.

Describe the general and specific habitat in which you observed the bird:

In a fresh water marsh in SE. Colorado. Cattails and bullrushes.

How did you eliminate similarly appearing species?

All other birds do not make any calls like "ki ki doo" like the Black Rail.

What is your prior experience with this and similarly appearing species?

I have seen one Black Rail on May 18, 1994 at Bent's Fort and heard 3 or 4 there in 1991. I heard 2 or more in 1992 at Bent's Fort.
